
Mission, Vision, and Purpose



Planning Year-Target Dates*



- Comprehensive Needs Assessment (Module 1): March 1
- Draft Plan: April 1
- Draft Budget: April 15
- Board Presentation and Submit to District: End of your School Year
- Districts Submit Final School Plans and Budgets to DEED May 31

*Note that these are target dates and not concrete deadlines- the purpose is to provide structure and guidance, but these dates may vary depending on your individual situation



Planning Grant-Budget



- Newly Designated Schools will receive a \$10,000 planning grant for FY23
 - Due to the increase in schools to be funded, only schools without current designations receive the planning grant
 - All other schools already in designation should use part of their current 1003a grant for planning needs
- Funds must be expended by June 30th, 2023



Planning Grant-GMS

- Budget and budget narratives in GMS
- For access to GMS see your district's User Access Administrator
 - If you don't know who that is reach out to Christy Roe
- Follow Uniform Grant Guidance rules
- Grants either "under revision" or will need "draft started" by district



Planning Grant-Utilization

 Examples provided are things that other schools have done, not necessarily direct recommendations from DEED on how to use your planning grant

Planning Grant-Utilization

- Paying for subs to cover for teachers while they are in School Improvement review/planning sessions
- Paying for teacher stipends for when they are working on the School Improvement Reviews/Plan outside of contract hours
- Paying for food/supplies for community engagement (for example, hosting a dinner for community members during which you go through the community review).
- Paying for travel for the district liaison to attend meetings
- Paying for childcare for community members so they can attend
 School Improvement reviews/planning sessions



School & Community Leadership Team

Goals:

- To diversify the perspectives informing school improvement initiatives
- Establish a partnership between the school and community to support student learning and achievement
- Transparency regarding data and goal-setting
- Ongoing plan sustainability

Program Review

Program Name Wilson Reading Program

Program Purpose/Description:

An intensive Tier 3 program for students grades 2-12 and adults with word-level deficits who are not making sufficient progress through their current intervention; have been unable to learn with other teaching strategies and require multisensory language instruction; or who require more intensive structured literacy due to a language-based disability, such as dyslexia.

Target Audience:

Students in grades 2-12 in small groups of no more than four or individuals

Program Data:

AIMSweb curriculum-based measurement (R-CBM and R-MAZE) results show that after one year in the program, students demonstrated statistically significant growth in oral reading fluency and reading comprehension.




Context Matters


